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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to self-defense immunity; amending s. 776.032, F.S.; providing that the state has the burden of proving that a defendant is not immune from prosecution under certain circumstances; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Subsection (1) of section 776.032, Florida Statutes, is republished, and subsection (4) is added to that section, to read:

776.032 Immunity from criminal prosecution and civil action for justifiable use or threatened use of force.—

(1) A person who uses or threatens to use force as permitted in s. 776.012, s. 776.013, or s. 776.031 is justified in such conduct and is immune from criminal prosecution and civil action for the use or threatened use of such force by the person, personal representative, or heirs of the person against whom the force was used or threatened, unless the person against whom force was used or threatened is a law enforcement officer, as defined in s. 943.10(14), who was acting in the performance of his or her official duties and the officer identified himself or herself in accordance with any applicable law or the person using or threatening to use force knew or reasonably should have known that the person was a law enforcement officer. As used in this subsection, the term "criminal prosecution" includes arresting, detaining in custody, and charging or prosecuting the defendant.

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(4) In a criminal prosecution, a defendant may file a pretrial motion claiming the right to the immunity from prosecution set forth in subsection (1). The motion must clearly state the reasons that the defendant is immune and allege the facts on which the claim of immunity is based. The court shall grant the motion after a pretrial hearing unless the state proves beyond a reasonable doubt that the defendant is not immune.

Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.
